Primary Duties of Officers

Fire Chief – Oversight of all administrative, operational, and fiscal aspects of the Fire Department - ensure the protection of lives and property within the Township from fire emergencies - Respond to citizen inquiries – serve as liaison between Fire Department and Township Board and other government entities (White Helmet)

Assistant Chief – support the Fire Chief by ensuring operational quality - Assist with developing budgets, training and programming – Determine equipment needs – perform administrative duties as needed (White Helmet)

Battalion Chief – Lead and manage a team of firefighters on the scene of an emergency – coordinate firefighting operations – maintain safety of firefighters and the public – Serve as Incident Commander in the absence of a higher-ranking officer (White Helmet)

Safety / Training Officer – Assess hazards and safety systems – Identify and mitigate risks – advise Incident Commander on operational safety – Take action to prevent harm – Determine training needs and plans for executing (White Helmet)

Primary Duties of Officers

Captain – Supervise operation of assigned apparatus and duties of personnel at an emergency scene - May serve as Incident Commander in the absence of a higher-ranking officer (Red Helmet)

Lieutenant – Lead a team of firefighters during emergency operations – May serve as Incident Commander in the absence of a higher-ranking officer (Red Helmet)

Driver/Engineer – Drive fire trucks to emergency scenes, including fire alarms, medical emergencies, and other calls – Operate firefighting apparatus including engines, tankers, pumpers and search & rescue vehicles (Yellow Helmet)

Firefighter – Perform firefighting duties, such as rescue, salvage and extinguishing fires (Black Helmet)

National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)


- Develops standards for training courses, apparatus, and equipment operation.

National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) – A Division of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)

- A data base for collecting information on all incidents including Fires, EMS calls, Severe Weather and natural disasters. All Fire and Ambulance corps must report all incidents no later than the 15th of each month following the incident, including negative reports.

OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970) and MIOSHA (Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1974)

- Ensure workplace safety and equitable labor relations for employees and employers, provide consultation and training opportunities.


